The Montgomery County Police Citizens Academy

The Montgomery County Police Department is currently accepting applications for future sessions of the Citizens Academy. The program is free. Participants must be 18 years of age or older and either live or work in Montgomery County. Participants attend up to 16 classes followed by a graduation ceremony. Some of the topics covered include: Maryland Traffic Law, Major Crimes investigations, drug identification, scams and frauds, firearm safety, canine demonstration, DWI/underage drinking and the procedures of the Emergency Response Team. Academy members have the option of touring the Montgomery County Corrections Facility, participating in a ride along with a police officer, and attending Cardio-Pulmonary Re-

Crime Reports Online

County residents can now track crime reports online, using <u>www.crimereports.com</u>. Small icons representing types of crime appear on a Google map. Users can set the parameters for a search, including a specific time period.

Crime reports are automatically uploaded to the site daily. Each incident identified on the site will have a report number that residents can use to obtain the actual police report at a station.

A County Police spokesperson informed us that another website, <u>www.Connectedcommunities.us</u>, is a very good source of crime statistics. This site focuses entirely on Montgomery County.



Comments from the last Police Citizens Advisory Board Meeting

On March 28, 2011 the Bethesda District Police Commander, Russ Hamill, conducted an advisory board meeting, which is open to interested citizens and meets approximately every two months, except in the summer, at District Headquarters in downtown Bethesda. He observed that car break-ins and car thefts continue to be aided and abetted, in many cases, by owners who leave cars unlocked, often with portable electronic devices lying in plain sight. He has, as on other occasions, asked owners to exercise prudence in this matter. It is pre-eminently a crime of opportunity with thieves moving through neighborhoods looking for easy pickings.

The Commander also encouraged citizens who are unsure that they are observing suspicious activity or behavior to resolve their doubt in favor of calling police. One should not worry that one is "bothering" the police. They want to respond in order to resolve doubt, even though such activities might turn out to be innocent.

Another Piece of Chicanery to Ponder

The following piece was submitted by one of our residents. The Editor has not independently verified the reality of the situation described and is submitting it out of general interest.

How to Lock Your Car and Why

I locked my car. As I walked away I heard my car door unlock. I went back and locked my car again three times. Each time, as soon as I started to walk away, I would hear it unlock again!! Naturally alarmed, I looked around and there were two guys sitting in a car in the fire lane next to the store. They were obviously watching me intently, and there was no doubt they were somehow involved in this very weird situation. I quickly chucked the errand I was on, jumped in my car and sped away. I went straight to the police station, told them what had happened, and found out I was part of a new, and very successful, scheme being used to gain entry into cars. Two weeks later, my friend's son had a similar happening....

While traveling, my friend's son stopped at a road-side rest to use the bathroom. When he came out to his car less than 4-5 minutes later, someone had gotten into his car and stolen his cell phone, laptop computer, GPS navigator, briefcase.....you name it. He called the police and since there were no signs of his car being broken into, the police told him he had been a victim of the latest robbery tactic -- there is a device that robbers are using now to clone your security code when you lock your doors on your car using your key-chain locking device..

They sit a distance away and watch for their next victim. They know you are going inside of the store, restaurant, or bathroom and that they now have a few minutes to steal and run. The police officer said to manually lock your car door-by hitting the lock button inside the car -- that way if there is someone sitting in a parking lot watching for their next victim, it will not be you.

When you hit the lock button on your car upon exiting, it does not send the security code, but if you walk away and use the door lock on your key chain, it sends the code through the airwaves where it can be instantly stolen.

This is very real.

The Real Estate World

The Market is on the Rise!

If robins are the harbinger of Spring, then the Washington area real estate market is the harbinger of recovery. Although the Case Schiller report, which came out last week, speaks depressingly of a continuingly moribund real estate environment throughout the country, it is two months behind in data but it also speaks positively about the Washington area market which has seen significant growth. The average price in the close-in Metro area rose for the 10th consecutive month over last year. Dollar volume of sales, which had declined with the slowdown that occurred last fall is up again for the 3rd month in a row. And consumer confidence is up in the Metro area and across the nation.

Contrary to expectations, interest rates are still at a historic low, though trending upwards slowly. With continued low rates and improving consumer confidence there is every indication that this Spring will be an even stronger period in our area than previously thought. Local lenders are still waving the inflation flag, however. They admit rates are lower than they thought they would be this time last year. But they continue to say that they won't go lower and that increasing inflations will take its toll on the mortgage market as well.

We were off to a slow start in terms of inventory reaching the market in February. There was little to sell! But March and now April are making up for lost time. More homes come on the market every week and the open houses are proving that there are plenty of buyers out there. The old cliché about location, locations still holds true, but has been amended to include: If it shows well, and is priced right, it will sell!

Currently in Kenwood Park, we still have the large home on Goldsboro Road for sale. There is one home currently for sale by owner on Durbin Road and one under contract on Lenox Road. One house sold on Millwood as a tear-down for \$800,000. Two more homes will be coming on the market in the next month. And at the request of one of our neighbors that I include rentals, one home on Whittier with 4 bedrooms and 3.5 baths rented for \$3500. The rental market is still tight, with little sign of loosening.

So it all looks good right now!

MC311 is Montgomery County's simple, three-digit, one stop phone number for customers to call (3-1-1) or site to visit (www.montgomerycountymd.gov/311) to obtain non-emergency County information and services and to enter service requests or send emails.

The system continues to grow and expand. As county residents become more familiar with it and the relative ease of reaching County services by simply dialing 311, the county expects call volume to continue to rise.

A recent survey of hundreds of 311 users showed about 75 percent of users satisfied with the time it took to reach a Customer Service Representative. Seventy-two percent were satisfied or extremely satisfied with the handling of their call. The survey showed 75 percent satisfied or extremely satisfied with their overall 311 experience.

Request for Vacation Coverage from the Security Service

The security service operates through the evening, night and morning.

If you want to make a specific request for vacation coverage or other specific service, call M-F between 9 AM and 5 PM before you leave town. Phone **301-384-7777**. A phone number of a local contact with a spare key is most helpful.

For an **evening emergency call 240-793-6255** (the patrol car). If there is any problem getting in contact immediately, call 301-384-7777 and ask for the supervisor of the Kenwood Park patrol service.

This service is available to members of KPCA who have subscribed to the security patrol. Non-members can easily sign up by contacting Ken Rubinson by phone or email, pres@KPCAonline.org.

Email Notifications

The KPCA is now sending out neighborhood information by email about four times a year and also if there is a warning needed about safety issues in the neighborhood. These include if a theft occurs, the presence of aggressive solicitations being made house to house, and if a child has been made uncomfortable by interaction with a stranger in the area.

Since all our neighbors do not have email or are not registered, we ask that the safety information be relayed by those who do receive the messages to their unconnected neighbors.
